This executive summary of the School Accountability Report Card (SARC) is intended to provide parents and community members with a quick snapshot of information related to individual public schools. About This School

The 3-R Community Day School (CDS) provides an educational option for students who have been unsuccessful in the comprehensive school environment and who have been or may be at risk of expulsion. These students often have academic, social-emotional, and/or attendance problems. This option provides a smaller, less distracting learning environment with more individual attention and greater supervision than the comprehensive school government. The special services that are available to students in the form of counseling, tutorials, group interactive skill building, service learning, and community service are also greater and can be more closely monitored.

The 3-R CDS Referral Committee reviews all students being transferred to the Community Day Schools. This committee consists of the superintendent/principal/counselor of the referring district, Community Day School teacher and the County Community Day School Liaison. All students placed by Board action due to expulsion, County SARB action, or the Nevada County Probation Department are reviewed and placed by the 3-R CDS Referral Committee. Based on availability of space, parents may request to have their student voluntarily transferred to the 3-R Community Day School. However, the 3-R CDS Referral Committee must approve this request.

IX. Student Performance

Standardized Testing and Reporting Program

The Standardized Testing and Reporting (STAR) Program consists of several key components, including:

- **California Standards Tests (CSTs)**, which include English-language arts (ELA) and mathematics in grades two through eleven; science in grades five, eight, and nine through eleven; and history-social science in grades eight, and nine through eleven.
- **California Modified Assessment (CMA)**, an alternate assessment that is based on modified achievement standards in ELA for grades three through eleven; mathematics for grades three through seven, Algebra I, and Geometry; and science in grades five and eight, and Life Science in grade ten. The CMA is designed to assess those students whose disabilities preclude them from achieving grade-level proficiency on an assessment of the California content standards with or without accommodations.
- **California Alternate Performance Assessment (CAPA)**, includes ELA and mathematics in grades two through eleven, and science for grades five, eight, and ten. The CAPA is given to those students with significant cognitive disabilities whose disabilities prevent them from taking either the CSTs with accommodations or modifications or the CMA with accommodations.

The assessments under the STAR Program show how well students are doing in relation to the state content standards. On each of these assessments, student scores are reported as performance levels.

Academic Performance Index

These requirements are designed to ensure that all eligible students are adequately prepared for University-level work.

Eligibility for admission to the California State University (CSU) is determined by three factors:

- Specific high school courses
- Grades in specified courses and test scores
- Graduation from high school

Because of the number of students who apply, a few campuses have higher standards (supplementary admission criteria) for all applicants. Most CSU campuses have local admission guarantee policies for students who graduate or transfer from high schools and colleges that are historically served by a CSU campus in that region.
